
Land Acknowledgement

The Regional Profile







Age Structure





Employment data in Fraser Lake and Northern BC, 2011-2021







Name of Provider - Village of Fraser Lake

The Fraser Lake Water Treatment Plant was built in 2009 and commissioned for use in the spring of 2010. The water plant treats lake water drawn from nearby Fraser Lake. An 8 metre deep 250mmx140m line gravity-feeds water from the lake into a wet well at the fresh water pumping station. There are two 1500 litre/min vertical turbine pumps powered by 50hp electric motors that pump water from the wet well to the Water Treatment Plant and subsequently to the distribution system in town and to the Water Reservoir. The Reservoir holds 1 million litres of water. The Water Treatment Plant's flow capacity is 22L/s.





Age Structure









The unemployment rate in Electoral Area D fell between 2016 and 2021.





Water and Wastewater Service

The RDBN Environmental Services Department works in conjunction with the Fort Fraser Local Commission, Northern Health, and the Ministry of Environment to manage and operate the drinking water and wastewater (sewage) services for the community of Fort Fraser. The water system includes two ground water wells, pump station, reservoir and distribution network, while the sewage treatment system includes a series of three lagoons which act to filter, treat and polish the effluent prior to discharge to the Nechako River.



Stellat'en First Nation

The Stellat'en First Nation (SFN) has existed and stewarded the land since time immemorial. Stellat'en translates to the 'People of Stella'. SFN serves the wellbeing of 556 registered members as of August 2021, with 28% of membership onreserve and 72% off-reserve. SFN exists to provide programs and services in an equitable manner to all members while striving to build a safe and healthy community. SFN works to represent the interests of our Nation with government and industry, to protect our territory, support our language and culture and ensure our future generations have healthy land, water, air, and resources.

The Stellat'en First Nation territory exudes beauty and abundance. The community of Stellaquo is located 160 kms west of Prince George, B.C. and sits on fertile land which was the basin of a glacial lake. Stellaquo is located at the confluence of two rivers: the Stellaquo and Endako. Stellaquo River is a world-renowned trout fishing location.

Nadleh Whut'en

The people of Nadleh Whut'en First Nation are Dakelh people, whose territory is located in the Central Interior of British Columbia around the east end of Fraser Lake. Until 1990, it was referred to as the Fraser Lake Indian Band.

Nadleh Whut'en has a registered population of 531 living on and off reserve. Most of the nation's members reside in Nadleh, the main community, while others (approximately 20) live in Lejac. Nadleh is located along the banks of the Nautley (Nadleh) river, between Fraser Lake and the Nechako River. Lejac is located on the south side of Fraser Lake.

The Nadleh Whut'en speak a dialect of the Carrier language which is part of the Athapaskan language family. Carrier people refer to themselves as Dakelh, which means "people who travel by water."
